# **School Overview**

Carcoola Primary School is located in a quiet rural environment. The 2021 student population of about 120 demonstrates a significant decrease in enrolments from the last couple of years.



This graph indicates the number of full time students (Pre primary – Year 6) enrolled in the school for the past five years. It does not include Kindergarten students (pre compulsory enrolments).

We believe the decline in student numbers is due to the changing demographic in the area with affordable rentals being sold or re-purposed as short term holiday accommodation.

### **Comments:**

In 2021, Carcoola PS experienced a decline in student enrolments from a total of 126 compulsory students at the end of 2020 to 107 compulsory students at the end of 2021.

#### Actions:

- Monitor enrolment patterns during 2022.
- Utilise the AEDC data from 2021 to understand the changing demographic of our catchment area.
- Increase parent engagement and raise the profile of Carcoola PS in the wider community to retain current students and encourage families to re-locate into our catchment.

# **Comments:**

Substantive Principal Michael Day on extended leave from end of Term 1. Acting Principal Fiona Blundell Term 2. Acting Principal Beverley Garnett Term 3 and 4. Six teaching staff and all of the education assistants are permanent employees of Carcoola PS, making up a total of 5.6FTE permanent teaching staff and two fixed term teachers making up a total of 1.0FTE. Education assistants total FTE is 4.8. The school also had 2.2FTE permanent teachers working elsewhere or on leave for 2021 and 0.4FTE permanent education assistants working elsewhere or on leave for 2021.


In 2021, Pre-Primary students had the lowest overall attendance rate of 85.0% and Year 5 students had the highest overall attendance rate of 90.0%.

#### Comment:

In 2021 our overall attendance rate improved from 82.5% to 88.5 %.

#### A focus in 2022 will be:

- continue to use and promote the SMS system that sends an automated request for an explanation to a nominated parent's phone when their child is absent;
- teacher vigilance when following up with parents when a student is absent;
- reminding parents of the disadvantages to their child's learning when they take them on holidays during term (a strict policy of no work packages for students on vacation will be maintained);
- implementing attendance plans for identified students; and
- develop a school wide Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Plan to sit under the umbrella of PBS to support positive student engagement with school.

Target not met

Our school performance was below like schools in Reading Writing and Numeracy for Year 3 and Year 5 in 2021. Longitudinal summary indicates significant drop in performance from 2019. Relative assessment indicates general downward trend since 2015 with a spike in higher achievement in 2019.

2. By 2021, at least 50% of our Year 3 students will achieve between proficiency bands 4-7 in NAPLAN and have good or excellent achievement.

- → 43% Year 3 Reading Like schools: 57% State: 68%
- → 25% Year 3 Reading good or excellent achievement.
- → 53% Year 3 Writing Like schools 75% State: 81%
- → 20% Year 3 Writing good or excellent achievement.
- → 37% Year 3 Numeracy Like schools: 52% State: 60%
- → 25% Year 3 Numeracy good or excellent achievement.
- 3. By 2021, at least 50% of our Year 5 students will achieve between proficiency bands 5-8 in NAPLAN and have good or excellent achievement.

Target not met

- → 76% Year 5 Reading Like schools: 77% State: 84%
- → 30% Year 5 Reading good or excellent achievement.
- → 62% Year 5 Writing Like schools 73% State: 80%
- → 0% Year 5 Writing good or excellent achievement.
- → 61% Year 5 Numeracy Like schools: 72% State: 80%
- → 15% Year 5 Numeracy good or excellent achievement.

4. When compared to like schools, fewer students in Year 3 and 5 are in the bottom 20% of NAPLAN literacy and numeracy, and more students in the top 20%.

5. All students make expected progress in literacy and numeracy between on entry assessment and NAPLAN.

Target not met.

- → In 2021, 40% of Year 3 students made expected progress in literacy (Reading) between on entry assessment and NAPLAN.
- ightarrow In 2021, 45% of Year 3 students made expected progress in numeracy between on entry assessment and NAPLAN.
- 6. Students become confident users of a variety of technologies as evidenced by engagement in the Technologies Curriculum and participation in NAPLAN online from 2019.
- → All Year 3 and Year 5 students participated in NAPLAN online assessment in 2021. Student survey indicated that students are engaging in using desktop and laptop computers in the classrooms, as well as iPads on a regular basis. Most students feel confident in using these tools.
- 7. On-entry assessment shows 75% of the students at 1.0 progression point at the end of Pre Primary.

Target not measurable.

- → Target was not measurable because students were not re-assessed at the end of each year. More appropriate target would be to look at progress measures, eg. From PP to Yr1 or PP to Yr2.
  - In 2021, 20% of students scored above the median score in all areas of on entry assessment.
- 8. At least 50% of students in Years 1-6 achieve age appropriate levels in PM Benchmark testing.
- → Staff have had some further training in this process and relevant data will be collected in term 4 this will be baseline data and can be used to inform target setting for the next strategic plan.

- 9. At least 60% of students will achieve a C grade in Writing by Semester 2 reporting.
- $\rightarrow$  At the end of Semester 2, 2021, 60.6% of students achieved a C grade for Writing.
- 10. By 2021, at least 50% of students Years 1 6 will achieve Stanine 4 and above in PAT Maths assessments.

# 12. Parents demonstrate satisfaction with the school direction through responses in the bi-annual community survey.

26 responses spread across all year levels. This represents approximately 37% of families.

92% of respondents would not like to receive information on becoming a member of the P & C

39% of respondents did not agree that this school has clear expectations regarding student behaviour

Extended response – areas the school could improve on:

Most concerns were about bullying and student behaviour.

#### **Comment:**

The response to the survey was low with only 37% of families engaging in the survey. The school will look at ways to reengage parents and families into the school, ensuring they all have a voice in how they see the school running. Due to the low response it is difficult to accurately gauge parent satisfaction with the school direction.

Work will be done through the PBS Committee to lift the profile of expectations regarding student behaviour.

Concerns around student behaviour and bullying have been taken on board and future directions will be to support students in their social and emotional development. A clear and transparent message around this topic will be presented to all families and the wider community.





#### **Comment:**

Changes for best practice to improve student performance have included

- Partnership with Murray Cluster schools, Rostrata Primary School and Shaping Minds

   High impact teaching strategies coaching and professional learning.
- Purchase and use of physical and human resources to be driven by student outcomes data and operational planning.
- Performance development data to drive targeted professional development for Education Assistants.
- Consistent school-wide pedagogical approaches to teaching of literacy and Numeracy to be investigated, developed and embedded into classroom practice.
- All staff using system and school assessment data to inform planning and measure student achievement and progress.
- Staff to receive professional learning in the use of Ed Companion data system and how to use the Gap Analysis feature for effective planning.
